In case you missed it, here are a few interesting historical tidbits that we heard along the way.

Was New Orleans really founded by prostitutes? Not quite. The "Mutinous Women" were often labeled as prostitutes unjustly. Corruption in the French legal system and societal prejudice against impoverished young women led to false imprisonments. When France sought to populate its new colony, these women were sent as easy targets for potential wives and mothers.

**How did Bay St. Louis get its name?** On August 24, 1699 – St. Louis's feast day – explorers Iberville and Bienville discovered and admired a "beautiful bay" along the Gulf Coast. In honor of the saint, they named it the Bay of St. Louis.

Who's buried in the old Biloxi Cemetery? Among others, two notable figures rest there: Joseph Lawson Howze, the first Black bishop to lead a US diocese and the founding bishop of the Diocese of Biloxi. Juan de Cuevas, the "Hero of Cat Island", defended the island during the War of 1812 by firing at British forces during the Battle of New Orleans.

What makes Fort Maurepas historically significant? It was the site of the original Louisiana French colony and served as the capital from 1699 to 1710. Named after Louis Phelypeaux, Comte de Maurepas, the Chancellor of France, the original fort was lost to fire in the early 1700s, leaving its exact location unknown.
